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Editorial Brian Bollen

Just in case anyone has been living on Mars over the past several months, that was the DHO Centenary that was. No one visiting Wengen in February 2025 could have been unaware of the fact, given the visual reminders being prominently displayed. These included a striking banner across Dorfstrasse, a wonderful display in the windows of Central Sport and a slot on the revolving infotainment display on trains between Lauterbrunnen and Kleine Scheidegg.

This year's Journal is one final celebration of this truly once-in-a-lifetime event. It contains a generous helping of articles, photos and other images related to the social celebrations that began with a curtain-raising dinner in London in November, and the height of which was the Gala Diner [sic] held on the evening of February 6 and the early morning of February 7 at Hotel Regina in Wengen. There is even the occasional mention of skiing activities.

The Secret Skier, for instance, enjoyed several weeks spread across January and February and has supplied an account of the time that should go some towards satisfying the appetites of those who could not make it to the region in 2024/25 and whet the appetites of those looking forward to 2025/65.

These columns touch upon just about every aspect of modern life in Wengen and the surrounding areas, including the ongoing refurbishment of hotels and local transport infrastructure. The revamped Belvedere,

Waldrand and Braunbär are back in operation, the Beausite Park, we hear, is planning its own remodelling from an already high standard, and the new trains operating between Grütschalp and Mürren are 'impressive'.

Secret Skier also looked forward to the reopening of the rebuilt cable car system to Schilthorn (the reopening of the Birg-Schilthorn section duly took place on March 15, 2025). Two key points emerge from even the most cursory discussion of rebuilding work. It will always take longer and cost more than planned.

A side-effect of preparations for the 100th anniversary, including the production of The Downhill Only Club A History, has been the proliferation of reminiscences of the DHO and Wengen by members.

This has resulted in a series of articles under the Time Bending rubric taking us back decades. If you enjoy reading them, and would like to add your own to the collection, please go ahead and contribute to the Journal in 2026, and beyond. Readers do enjoy hearing about the good old days, and seeing photos.

Another side-effect was the appearance of articles in media beyond the DHO Journal and website. These included full-length features in the Financial Times, Skier and Snowboarder magazine, Berner Oberlander Zeitung and Beau Monde Traveller.

A separate feature on the BBC included

extensive references to Wengen, and a modest contribution from your Hon Editor, but this one was about building new properties in Switzerland rather than the DHO centenary.

As always, I would like to express a very public thank you to all our regular contributors and the occasional irregular. Without them, and without interjections from other readers, it would simply not be possible to produce anything vaguely resembling a convincing account of life in the DHO.

Now in its 101st year, the Club, as an integral feature of its administrative and geographical landscape, is wrestling with the conundrum of a life that its 14 founders back on February 7 1925 probably never even gave a thought to.

The flattening of the village of Blatten by an avalanche of rock and ice from the Birchgletscher surely sounds an alarm bell that even the most hardened climate change sceptic will hear. This news followed hard on the heels of an avalanche on the Eiger that killed two skiers and injured five others, reinforcing the potential hazards posed by mountainous terrain. Despite this, good skiing, as a predecessor in the role of Hon Editor used to end his annual introduction by saying. Good skiing.

And please pay even more attention to avalanche warnings and other harbingers of potential violent disruption than you might once have done...



From 1925 to 2025 with the Downhill Only Club

The planning of the DHO Centenary Celebrations was in the making for over four years. I cannot believe that it's now over eight months ago that 150 members, friends and special guests - many wearing 1920s dress and others in timeless formal wear - sat down to a wonderful evening at Wengen's Hotel Regina, arranged by Deborah Flindall and Susie Davies.

Thursday February 6 2025, the eve of the 100th anniversary itself, was our Big Day. As is customary for the first Thursday in February, the prizegiving for the McMillan races was held at 18.00 in the DHO Clubroom. Sina Cova, our Honorary President kindly presented the prizes, most of which was captured on camera with one eye very much on future history books. Without doubt, a key feature of the evening was the presentation to the Club of a wonderfully carved wooden bench kindly donated by Judith Graf-Engi and Rolf Wegmüller on behalf of Wengen Tourismus.

Moving to the Hotel Regina for a 19.30 start, Huw Alban Davies made a wonderful Master of Ceremonies, keeping the evening flowing beautifully. It was an honour to have with us some distinguished guests to help us with our celebrations.

DHO President Sarah Hoyle's After Dinner Speech

"Your Excellency, Distinguished guests, past Presidents of which there are five here tonight, fellow members, friends, families and other welcome guests. If you don't fit into one of these categories, then you are still very welcome unless you think that you are at the wrong venue. Thanks to everyone for making such an effort to be here for this auspicious occasion.

Unfortunately, we have come to that point in the evening's affairs when someone inevitably stands up to speak, promising to take only a few minutes of your time.

I am indeed honoured as your current President to be that person and I promise that I will not take up a lot of your time.

I am sure that we have all asked why we are here tonight. The answer is simply to celebrate the creation 100 years ago of a Club that began life in an atmosphere of sporting rivalry with a certain other club across the Lauterbrunnen Valley that shall remain nameless. We are here to remember in particular those gentlemen who founded the DHO on 7th February 2025 at the Palace hotel, and to all those who over the past 100 years have played a part in bringing the club to where it is today.

The first set of DHO rules that we still have are in the handwriting of the Club's first Honorary Secretary, Donald Dalrymple. Donald wrote in the first committee minutes back in 1925 that the aim of the Club was to improve the quality of skiing in Wengen. I humbly suggest that the DHO might just have played a role in doing that. It is also recorded in one of the early minutes that it was agreed that a joke be made at the beginning of each meeting. Perhaps this is one for the future!!

The 14 founders were mostly British but included a number of prominent local Swiss people, such as Fritz Borter, the proprietor of the Palace Hotel, where the early meetings all took place. I had the pleasure of meeting Beatrice, Fritz's grand daughter recently. She and her husband Marco now live in Zurich but have property here in wengen.

The founders chose the name 'Downhill Only' because Wengen skiers had the Wengernalpbahn to carry them up the mountain, whereas Mürren had no such facility.

The DHO has had close links with the local community since its inception. Along with the Ski Club Wengen and the Swiss Academic Ski Club, it played a role in the development of local skiing facilities and tourism, including the Lauberhorn Race.

DHO members were early participants in the Lauberhorn Races and even featured among the first recorded winners.

Ernst Gertsch, the father of the Lauberhorn Races, was an enthusiastic supporter of the DHO and became its Honorary President. His son, Viktor, who succeeded his father as Head of the Lauberhorn Race, also became the DHO's Honorary President.

That role is held today by Sina Cova of the Hotel Falken, underlining the sense of local commitment and continuity and we are all grateful to Sina who is with us this evening in all she does for the club.

In its first century, the DHO has been an integral part of Wengen's development as a prime international ski resort, and counts an Olympic and World champion amongst its members, in Ryan Regez.

Ryan is not with us this evening, but I would like to acknowledge once again his extraordinary achievements in the winter of 2022, and congratulate him on them.

The Club today has around 850 members of many nationalities. Its focus in what we might call the modern era is on social skiing and Ski Racing, but with a special emphasis through its Coggins and Eagles programmes on the development of young skiers.

Racing remains important, despite the very recent decision to call a natural end to the life of DHO Racing & Training, almost a club within the Club.

DHO Racing teams today regularly participate in the legendary Inferno Race in

Mürren and the Amateur Inter Club Championships. Since 1999, the DHO has organised the British Schoolboys' Races, bringing schools from Britain and some from Switzerland to Wengen and every winter.

Members of the Club still race every February for the McMillan Cup, one of the few remaining ski events where all participants start together in the time-honoured 'geschmozzle' way. My congratulations to Thomas Clayton who was declared the winner of the McMillan earlier today.

Maybe one thing that has quietly disappeared down the decades is the sense of humour that characterised much of the DHO and its communications.

Anyone who has gone through the archives will know, for example, what an accomplished cartoonist and wit Ken Foster was, literally from the very beginning.

Ken was one of the original 14 members, launched the DHO Journal in 1936, and spent much of the rest of his active life serving the Club in one capacity or another.

If any of his family who are here tonight can draw half as well as he did, with such lightness of touch, please talk to our Honorary Editor about the possibility of becoming a regular contributor.

David Cornwell was another member who was a gifted cartoonist, contributing regularly to the DHO Journal, long before he became better known to the world at large as the novelist John le Carré.

David brought great humour to a number of issues, not least through his affectionate caricatures of local Wengen personalities from the 1950s onwards.

He also had a reputation not only for speaking excellent German, but in particular for being able to speak in the local Wengen manner, and mimic the announcements made by the local train staff.

We have skipped through the past 100 years



of the DHO, and briefly considered its place in the skiing and tourism ecosystem.

I have purposely omitted using a number of names in fear of forgetting someone.

However, those of you here this evening and who have made a significant impact on activities within the club know who you are and on behalf of us all salute you. In saying this I must include our local organisations/businesses such as the Jungfraubahn, Gemeinde, Wengen Tourismus

and Wengen Hoteliers who we could not be without. In addition, standing here reciting the history of the club was not required as you can find it in the excellent book recently compiled by Ingrid Christophersen and Brian Bollen. Thank you to both of you.

Looking to the future has been a key element in my time so far as its President. From that experience, I can say hand on heart that the DHO looks forward to continuing its close relationship with Wengen for the next 100 years, at least. We recognise the need for change but at all times ensuring that we strive to be the leading International Alpine Ski Club

Please enjoy the rest of the evening. Please drink responsibly, the lifelong health service professional within me, urges. Perhaps more importantly, please dance responsibly.

It was February 1996 when this started. Paul Zvegintzov asked me: "You're an instructor of sorts, could you take a kids group for us next week?"

I loved it and just like that here we are 29 years later.

Coggins had been run by a succession of young DHO members over the years and I took to the task of developing a planned training programme where kids would have fun whilst never thinking they were in ski school. It worked and I have continued to develop the same system of task-based learning ever since. Have fun and change what is happening under their feet. Challenge their balance and perceptions. Work on individual capabilities to form a cohesive group. Have FUN!!

I have watched kids find a joy in skiing and talents they didn't imagine they had. I have seen shy children come alive and confident kids find empathy. They have all suffered my lessons on the geomorphology of landscape and glaciation. We have had countless sweety stops, hot choccy treats, jumped off little cliffs, got buried in powder, done tricks and enjoyed the enormous privilege of racing on world cup courses.

I have seen eight DHO Presidents and four Wengen Secretaries come and go and carried on regardless. But now I find that I have to admit to getting a bit long in the tooth to do the job to the standard I set myself so it is time to pass the baton.

After that first week we built up to seasons where we could fill seven weeks and with four Coggins groups in half-term week. We are currently building again after Covid so rudely interrupted Coggins development. Andrew Davies will now take on the challenge of building back to the glory days whilst guaranteeing a fun time for the kids in his care.

In 2000 I joined the Swiss Ski School Wengen and continued to run Coggins. By now I was organising every thing from taking enquiries through to the final accounts and enjoying being in charge. I worked to increase my knowledge and level of qualification to stay ahead of the kids and to get some more letters after my name.

We added Eagles for the teenagers mostly due to the efforts of one Will Wells and that has been a main stay now for many years. Friendships made

in Coggins have continued long into later life and I am happy to see my old boys and girls bringing their own kids to Wengen.

I found Rachel and we married in 2012. Of course she is a qualified ski coach and has helped me run the Coggins for many years now. It has been an absolute privilege and a joy to work with so many bright and talented kids over the years and to be able to call many of them my friends as they become adults. They still come to wonderful Wengen, sit and have a beer with us and still recall events from their time as Coggins. Maybe I should apologise to the parents who have had to buy apartments in Wengen because the kids would not ski anywhere else.

Rachel and I remain as Instructors with Swiss Ski School Wengen and I will continue to run the adult development courses for the club. I may also be allowed to take the odd group of Coggins. We hope to keep teaching and coaching skiers until our legs drop off so will hopefully be around for a few more years yet!

I am very proud of what we have achieved with Coggins and Eagles and I would like to thank all those who have supported my work with the Coggins programme over the last 29 seasons and especially all the kids who made it a joy to be on the hill. You know who you are.

I am very pleased to be able to pass on the Coggins and Eagles to the very capable hands of Andrew Davies who will, I am sure, develop the Coggins training programme to even higher levels of achievement.



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















Time Bending (A)



I first went to Wengen nearly 70 years ago, in February 1958 to be precise, just before I married Dick Edmonds (a long-time DHO Member, joined in 1950, Hon Editor 1956-65 and President 1970-75). We were introduced by Ros Hepworth, a cousin of my Mother, after the DHO Dinner Dance in November 1957. I was a skiing novice compared to Dick, so I had a steep learning curve!.

I quickly decided I had to give up or take intensive lessons so for the next five years my guide was Fritz Gertsch from Stechelberg. Dick was an avid ski tourer so that was my next step! Starting with Fritz at the back of the group I started to gain experience and confidence.

In those early days we stayed at the old Eiger with the then young Karl Fuchs who was the perfect hotelier. His steak tartare was the best in the Berner Oberland!

The legendary Chris Mackintosh was President with Ros Hepworth and Max Aitken as Vice-Presidents. There are wonderful stories about Chris in DHO folklore, including his naming of Mac's Leap - probably not skiable now. He was a great tease and must have given the WAB employees a hard time with various jokes.

Ros was truly amazing. Her life was devoted to the DHO and her trainees. Not only in Wengen and her chalet in Lauterbrunnen, but also her house in Caversham Street (in Chelsea, London) where numerous trainees were welcome to go for meals or stay. John Rigby, who skied in the 1964 Olympics, remembers staying with Ros nearly every school holiday as his parents were living abroad.

As a family we used to see Ros in England, both in England and at Micklefield (in Rickmansworth); she would drive for miles in the DHO mini-van and nothing would be too much trouble. Impossible to argue with, she would smile sweetly and announce that she had turned her hearing aid off!

I remember her arriving in Wengen one year in the 1960s with Piers Benson Browning who became a regular in Wengen with his Disco and skiing with so many of us. A wonderful photographer, he took many photographs of our family, including daughter Anna's wedding.

Another Wengen family were the Cornwells in their Chalet Chamois. Dick and David Cornwell [later to become globally known as the author John le Carré] had been recruited by Ros to join the DHO training in the early 1950s. No argument. Ros wielded a three-line whip.

Miriam Rothschild had the Chalet Miriam and was a familiar figure in Wengen's Dorfstrasse pulling her luge. She was really kind, having our children to tea fairly often. In the 50s and 60s apres-ski could be drinks at the Round Table in the Eiger or champagne cocktails at Frieda's, which was just below the Palace.

Dining at the Palace meant black tie and quite formal, often going on to the Belair Bar [now Da Sina's Pizzeria] to dance.

Whether in Wengen or on the glaciers our generation had wonderful skiing and a lot of fun! Sadly, Dick had to stop touring in the late 60s but I carried on and also enjoyed climbing. After Dick died in 2002, daughter Anna organised the family to do something to raise money for our local Stroke Unit at Watford General Hospital.

Having been teased for years by Dick about climbing a 4,000-metre peak, guided by Adolf Schlunegger I climbed the Monch in July 2003 as my contribution to the family's efforts and enjoyed every moment!

Back in the present day, my Rankin greatgrandchildren are fifth-generation

Wengeners! So good that the DHO is still thriving!

I enjoyed seeing photographs and hearing about the Centenary celebrations in February, really enjoyed reading the history and hope the DHO continues to prosper.

January 5 (Sunday)

Back in Wengen town! The flight this year was a breeze as we got upgraded into those pods where you can lie flat and actually get some real sleep. I always envied the pod people and now I am one of them! Problem with that is like all luxuries, they work on a ratchet system - you go up easily enough, but it's so much harder to come back down. We are now forever doomed by knowing what we're missing as we reluctantly walk by the pod people to our seats with the rest of the great unwashed.

Pick up our newly tuned skies and it's the first day on the pistes. A dusting of new snow is welcome as the highway routes (ramp off Männlichen) are icy. We enjoy a warm-up in the Start Bar at the top of Wixi. Lots of room now, but in a week this place will be a zoo. Meet some fun young folks who run the Hangover nightclub in Interlaken. Not our cup of tea, but would have been many moons ago. Enjoy the run to Brandegg and the first Gerschte Suppe of the season. When we try to catch the train back up to Kleine Scheidegg, the unthinkable happens. It is out of operation. You mean this can happen to the Swiss as well? So, it's down to Grindelwald, skate over to Terminal, up Gummi, up Arven and ski-out home.

January 8 (Wednesday)

Drizzly, dreary morning. Head down to Lauterbrunnen and up to Grütschalp where we see the new train cars for the first time. They are impressive. Bright yellow and sleek as can be (see DHO Journal 2024 page 79). I feel like we are in New York City, not the Oberland. I miss the old Brown Boveri cars that seemed a little more in tune with their environment. But you can't stop progress. You basically just drop through the roof at the ground station! That station is finished with a lot of wood and makes for a great addition to the region. The dogleg to Gimmelwald continues in operation. Piz Gloria is shut down as they finish the final construction on the upper segments, so the Inferno must start at Birg this year. We are told the entire system should be up and running in time for the summer season.

January 9 (Thursday)

I am paying the price for that walk through the rain yesterday. Caught one of those nasty chest colds. The Oberland climate can do that to you. With overcast, snowy weather forecast for the next few days, I must lie low. The good news is the forecast for next week - sun, sun, sun. Looking forward to a great Lauberhorn this year.

January 12 (Sunday)

Feeling better today and with the sun out in force, it's time to get back to work on the boards. Blue skies, new dusting of snow... what more can you want? Do the circuits in the Wengen region (Männlichen, Läger, Gummi, Honegg, Arven, Lauberhorn, Wixi) for most of the day. While the Swiss Army has moved onto the mountain, with the Lauberhorn piste already being in such good condition, there isn't that much for them to do this year. The weather forecast is super, so it looks like it's going to be a great race week.

January 13 (Monday)

Another great day on the boards, more blue sky and good snow. Do all the Wengen circuits finished by a run to Brandegg in the late afternoon for some of that fabulous Gerschte Suppe. This will be my last day on the boards for a while as I have volunteered to work on the Lauberhorn Races this year. Having volunteered at the Inferno the past few years, I felt it was time to up my game and join the big leagues. Looking forward to rubbing elbows with the ski racing elite. Popped into the DHO Clubroom après ski and picked up a copy of the DHO 100 Year History compiled by Ingrid Christophersen and Brian Bollen. Being a relatively recent DHO member, I find the rich history fascinating.



January 14 (Tuesday)

First day as a Lauberhorn volunteer. Spend the day at the Ziel, as they are holding a downhill training run today. The stands are free to anyone who wants to watch, and while the race cameras are not on yet (you follow the interval times and see the skiers shoot into the finish), it allows you to see what a working day on the circuit is like for these skiers - and on a day where you need not fight the mob like on race day.

January 15 (Wednesday)

Another day at the Ziel - the second downhill training run. There is a small chance of the Guggiföhn making an appearance tomorrow. This is the infamous local phenomenon of wind from the southeast that rolls up the Aletschgletscher, over the Jungfraujoch and Guggigletscher, before picking up speed and swooshing down the Lauberhorn valley. In November, 2019, it ripped the roof off the Lauberhorn Start Hut, blowing it 20 metres away! So, better safe than sorry and schedule the training run today. There is lots of blue sky and the run proceeds cleanly. No incidents like last year. The track looks to be in perfect condition and the racers have now had a good look at it before the rubber hits the road at the end of the week. While as volunteers, we may not pester the ski aces for pics or autographs, I get to hold Marco Odermatt's skis and poles as he takes the time to provide autographs to all those little tykes waiting their turn for World Cup glory.

January 16 (Thursday)

With the training run completed yesterday, the Lauberhorn volunteers have a day off. And what a day. Blue skies, and no sign of the dreaded Guggiföhn! We scramble over to Kleine Scheidegg to watch the Patrouille Suisse put in their practice runs. They seem to make it an extended show today, perhaps to smooth out those last wrinkles. Watching the aeroplanes from Kleine Scheidegg, you don't get that rush from when they buzz you on the top of the Wixi, but it's much easier to see them coming and enjoy their manoeuvres. They look to be in top form, like the pistes. In the evening, the start numbers for tomorrow's Super G are drawn and the usual excitement starts to build. It will be fun to be in the thick of it tomorrow, as the racers finally get to carve up those perfect pistes for real.

January 17 (Friday)

First race day of 2025! I'm up to meet my crew at Wengen base station at 06:30. My assignment today - the Hundschopf - Ground Zero for the Lauberhorn. We head up to Kleine Scheidegg and I marvel at the beautiful atmosphere this time of the morning (Morgen Rot) - much earlier than I usually find myself on the slopes. The excitement today is when we get an emergency call to come down to the water station where we assist in evacuating two

drunks who somehow got over the first net of the double-netting that secures the race path. We drag them out of the way before they can do any damage to themselves or others. It is a fabulous race day and the Swiss crowd (27,500 strong) is ecstatic as relative newcomer Franjo von Allmen from the Oberland clinches his first top podium. Swiss Stefan Rogentin places third, shaking off a fall into the nets on Tuesday's first training run. I'm thrilled to see the strong Canadian showing with James Crawford in fourth and Cameron Alexander eighth. Looking forward to tomorrow.

January 18 (Saturday)

Lauberhorn Downhill! Not a cloud to be seen. I head up to the schoolhouse meeting place at 06:30 and it is packed. The entire Lauberhorn volunteer team are here. What the heck is going on? That impish Guggiföhn has appeared, with winds over 100 km/hr. Remedial work is required on the track to prep the upper, wind-blown slopes. At 06:45 I get a call. Can you be a Team Leader? Yessir. So, it's off to the Start Bar at the top of the Wixi with my walkie talkie. With the high winds, there is a serious question as to whether the race will start from the top, or must go from lower down at the Super G start point. At 11:15 the winds let up and at 11:30 the decision is made to run from the top. The Lauberhorn luck holds again. All the commotion has only resulted in a 15-minute delay. The first racer down sets a new race record! Some tweaks to the course and the perfect conditions make for a fast run. There is concern as Austrian Vinzent Kriechmayr falls into the net at the end of the Ziel-S. He walks off under his own steam, but something is wrong with his right leg...hoping nothing serious. Wengen is one of his favourites on the circuit and the crowd loves him. When new Oberland sensation Franjo von Allmen flies down the slope, the crowd (40,000 strong today) goes wild. They are not disappointed as he registers the best time. But hang on, Marco Odermatt follows a few skiers later and ropes in his young protégé, showing him that Odi is still the king, for now. After another injury and race stoppage (French skier Blaise Giezendanner is helicoptered out), the crowd anxiously watches the remaining racers to see if anyone will upset their fairytale Saturday. Not to fear, the Swiss 1-2 finish remains unchallenged. The depth of the

Swiss Downhill team this year is noteworthy. This is their fourth 1-2 finish in a row (Beaver Creek, Gröden, Bormio, Wengen). The Canadians are still holding their own with Cameron Alexander fifth and James Crawford ninth. All is set for the party in Wengen town tonight.

January 19 (Sunday)

Slalom day. Meet at 08.00 at the Ziel. My post is directly behind the winner's "hot seat" so I will probably be a TV star today. Some overcast keeps the snow in good shape. The Swiss are strong again (4-5-6) but as gracious hosts, they yield the podium to a Norwegian sweep (McGrath, Haugan, Kristoffersen). And so the Lauberhorn 2025 edition comes to a close. And what an edition! A new Swiss star is born, the downhill record time is shattered amongst perfect conditions and the Swiss team gels in the downhill.

January 20 (Monday)

Hear that? Nothing? Exactly. It is the quiet of the day after. Wengen starts its return to normal. It will take weeks to demobilise, but the waves of fans are gone...there is room again in your favourite pubs. We spend the day over at the Schilthorn. It is gloriously quiet with no queues anywhere. Several warm-up runs on Winteregg then over to the Schilt for a few runs and a quick stop at Suppenalp. Finally, it's up to Birg. We travel in the new Funifor cable cars and marvel at the build-out at the top of Birg. The two new cable car lines have been built to the right (looking uphill) of the old line, which will be retired. The station is still a construction zone but we can see the progress from last year. A March completion date is within reach. We ski the Riggli a few times, then do loops on the Muttleren and Kandahar, before enjoying a warm-up in the Schilthornhütte. Then it's down the ski-out into the village (Allmenhubel base station) and a stop at the sport centre to pick up my volunteer materials and marching orders for the next couple of days. On the return to Wengen, there is time for a few après beers at the Crystal. Sammy tells us they slept most of the day today recovering from the Lauberhorn blitz that had them working into the wee hours during race week. We sense that while the extra income is welcome, they are also happy that race week happens but once a year.

January 21 (Tuesday)

Peeking over the balcony this morning, we see two foxes frolicking in the field below. They play for a while, then head up the path to the village . . . maybe to catch the 08:42 to Lauterbrunnen! They remind us how nice it is to live in nature. It's a bluebird day so we head up the Männlichen and down to Grindelwald, with a quick stop in the Vorsass Stuba, on the way to the First region. At the top of First, we enjoy several runs on the Oberjoch chair, before stopping at one of our favourite haunts, the Geneppi, for some refreshment. We marvel at the view. No wind, other than the backwash from the First Flyer swooshing down the hill every few minutes...it is again one of those glorious, Oberland days. We spend the balance of the afternoon skiing the bowls off the Schilt and Grindel chairs. We take ski-out 23, our favourite. It lies closest to the Wetterhorn and was closed last season due to lack of snow. Down to Terminal, up the Männlichen and down again to Wengen, in the cable car, as it is already 16.00 and the legs tell us they've had enough.

January 22 (Wednesday)

Overcast today. Spend the morning on some chores in Interlaken as I am volunteering at the Inferno cross-country races later today. Around 13:30 I make my way over to meet up with the team at the Mürren sports centre. The cross-country race consists of 399 contestants weaving their way through the Village between 16.00 and 19.00. I am teamed up with Christoph Lang, who is somewhat of an Inferno legend. At the age of 72, he has done the race 25 times and will don a bib again this Saturday as a forerunner. Our post is at the Bäckerei, which is the site of the only built-up bump on the track. We help four people who fall, one requiring a call-out to the ski patrol for a pulled muscle. Other than that, the race goes well. Back to Wengen at 21.00 to get ready for tomorrow's GS action.

January 23 (Thursday)

Up early. Rain turns into snow. The Inferno GS course that runs from the top of the Winteregg chair to the bottom has poor visibility. The race starts at 10.00 with 388 participants. Including a 20-minute time-out due to a power failure, the race takes about three hours to conclude. Following their run through the mist, the racers warm up and

enjoy refreshments in the Winteregg restaurant. The race runs without incident, so a good omen for Saturday's main event.

January 24 (Friday)

As I have the day off from Inferno volunteer duties, it's off for some skiing. The winds at the top of the Männlichen are strong. The Läger is closed. We make our way over to the Gummi and see that the Honegg is also closed. The Arven has started up again, so we head up to Kleine Scheidegg and get in some runs on the Lauberhorn and Wixi. Early exit as we have friends over for drinks.

Off to watch the Inferno craziness. Again,

January 25 (Saturday)

the gods have blessed us with a great bluesky race day. On the bus to the Stechelberg ground station, we chat with a Swiss gearing up for the race. She advises she is Number 1021 and will start around 13.00. We wish her well. From the Schilthorn Mürren station, we walk through town to the Allmendhubel funicular. At the top, we walk over to the viewpoint above the turn that takes the skiers down the valley and onto the Woodcutters uphill. Grabbing a beer and bratwurst we watch as the racers zoom by and skate up the path to the shouts of encouragement from the fans lining the side of the track. Then it's down to Winteregg, to the Finish area to mix with racers coming off the track. They are downing beers and sharing stories of their runs in the flush of post-race euphoria. The excitement is infectious as the crowd soaks up the good times to the tunes of the local Guggimusik band. Over the loudspeaker we hear that Andrew Davies from Edinburgh has finished. Good on you Andrew (he heads up the DHO Inferno team). We spot Bib 1021 and congratulate the racer we met on the bus in the morning. She is excited and relieved to have survived the race, noting that the track was in OK shape subject to rutted sections. In the evening I report to work at 20.00 at the Sport Centre where I pour libations for the partiers into the wee hours of the morning. I find out that at the famed Hahnenkamm Downhill in Kitzbühel, the Canadians have finally realised their potential with a two-podium finish. James Crawford wins it while Cameron Alexander comes in third. Between, is, of course, a Swiss. No, not Odi, but his teammate Alexis Monney. It's a Canuck sandwich - two slabs

of Canadian back bacon enclosing a slice of Swiss cheese! The Londoner (storied local hangout of the Canadian and American teams) will be hopping tonight. A great day all round.

January 26 (Sunday)

Didn't get to bed until 03.00, so a slow start today. The day begins with blue skies, and we get on the boards by 11.00. We do several circuits on the Lauberhorn. That people-mover at the base of the chair is dependable this year. Folks are getting the message that they must keep the three-metre spacing or risk overloading it and facing the constant shutdowns that plagued it over the last few years. Wind picks up in the afternoon and skies cloud over. We may be in for weather in the next few days.

January 27 (Monday)

Overcast with some snow in the afternoon. Off the boards today. Looking forward to the snow predicted over the next few days.

January 28 (Tuesday)

The snow gods have been merciful. We get a big dump overnight. As it is overcast and drizzly in the morning, we take a day off and hike down to Lauterbrunnen, then do the Stechelberg-Mürren-Lauterbrunnen loop. We note that Birg is closed to skiers due to avalanche danger. We look forward to sun tomorrow to carve up some of that new snow.

January 29 (Wednesday)

Great day to go at that new snow. We spend the day in the Wengen region. Blue skies all morning. Light overcast floats in around 14.00. We find the pistes tiring, as it takes some effort to push the new snow around, but it is a delight to work away at it under the bright sun. Off-piste conditions are good, although they quickly transition from powder to chop. It almost feels like a weekend day. No doubt a lot of fairweather skiers have been lured up from the Unterland by the blue skies and new snow. There is enough new

snow to provide good conditions for many weeks to come. Quite a change from last season.

January 30 (Thursday)

Overcast. We head over to First. The light is flat, can't see a thing. We give up after a couple of hours. We've become spoiled by the good weather. The nice thing about a season's pass is you don't feel that pressure to ski every day, like the lady we met on the lift on a four-day vacation. The snow will keep for sunnier days when you can actually see what you're doing.

January 31 (Friday)

Overcast. Fog in the afternoon. Not a day for the boards, at least not for these fairweather skiers.

Victoria Marshall goes down Memory Piste

Where to start with the 50+ years that I have been coming to Wengen, the great characters that I have skied with, the vast changes over the years and the wonderful locals that I have come to know, making it feel like my second home?

The first few years were spent in ski school of which I have many fond memories. Great instructors, to name just three, Fredy Fuchs, Hans Gertsch, Fritz Gertsch; all classes were good fun and we were briefly introduced to off-piste as well stem turns, slide slipping, snow ploughs and of course the correct way to go up the many T-bars! Inner Wengen, Brunner slope (not replaced), Lauberhorn, Männlichen, Tschuggen (still there) and Salzegg, they all had their challenges!! Of course ALL now replaced with chair lifts!

I joined the DHO in 1973 once Piers Benson Browning had completed my initiation test. Skiing then became a totally different experience having great leaders, Harold Thorpe (who had a story to tell at every turn!) and also very rarely went on the piste (no restrictions in those days!!).

One thing about skiing with leaders who knew the resort so well, you never knew the piste number and to this day I still have no idea!! Jonny Webster, another off-piste

champion, also introduced me to ski touring which was always an adventure. All the tours were brilliantly led by Adolf Schunegger, an amazing ski guide.

I have been very lucky and privileged to have been on some great tours, one in Italy but mainly in Switzerland of which a couple were local to Wengen from the Jungfraujoch. We stayed in Konkordia Hut onto Finsteraarhorn, Grünegghorn and beyond! Day tours included Eismeer (a nightmare to get off the glacier!!), Aletschgletscher, Konkordiaplatz to Blatten and from the Schilthorn ridge are a few examples. They all had different experiences, some challenging but always memorable and many stories could be told!!

I have many other great times that we had with the DHO, going up to Wengernalp for cheese fondue and then skiing back down to the village to end the evening in the Eiger all at the "round table"! The first DHO office was off the high street down a steep slope, but the one that has many memories is the curling hut by the ice rink. Great office hour which more often than not continued onto an extended drinks party!!

Other DHO events remembered with fondness, dinner dances at the Savoy Hotel held in November, and of course our 50th Anniversary at The Palace in 1975 and 60th at the Bellevue Scheidegg in 1985, when the communication cord was activated on the return train journey to Wengen but no arrests were made!!

In the 70s and 80s I went in for many of the 'fun' races: Kurverein Crystal, Andy Capp, Jungfrau Marathon and especially remembering The Railway Cup with which Dr Herni, director of the Jungfrau railway, was involved, plus Fredy Fuchs who was in charge of the pistes. Both were great characters and determined we all had a good time!!

We had lunch afterwards in the directors dining room at Eigergletscher, always finishing the meal with schnapps being poured from a bottle inside which was a man climbing up a ladder!! Those of us who skied home, very well I should mention, and generally down 'Oh God' into the 'hut' for prizegiving!!

DHO summer visits started in 1981. Oskar Gertsch was a brilliant host, on the first occasion meeting us at the airport! We were entertained royally by Wengen hoteliers and residents, and enjoyed trips to Jungfraujoch, Trümmelbach falls, Schynige Platte and local walks.

I decided in 2018 that I should conquer the Mönch after all the years of skiing beneath it!! I contacted Adolf to ask if he would be happy and also feel I was capable to give it go! The answer was YES, so hard training began. The weekend before was spent with Adolf Schlunegger, and we went to Glacier 3000 for crampon and rope training. On June 18 we stood on the top looking down at Grindlewald and Scheidegg below, an amazing and brilliant day the top ridge being the most challenging!!

To sum up the last 50+ years, I have experienced such fun and enjoyment

learning to ski in Wengen and then skiing with such wonderful people the DHO leaders, the aforementioned Harold Thorpe and Jonny Webster, Peter Lightfoot and Paul Z, to name the most memorable ones!!

I feel that I should also mention Paul and Margaret von Allmen. The Alpenrose has been my home from home and now we are on the third generation (Ursula and family)!! Also Christoph and Käthi Gertsch, Christoph's father (Edward Sports) looked after my father, and then Christoph became my ski adviser!!

I'm aiming to ski for a few more years, but the conditions have to be good, NO flat light and good snow conditions also I bought new skis three years ago!! The mountains still call us not only in winter we also love going late summer, therefore visiting Wengen and the area will continue for a while yet, we hope!

In 1908, just three years after the Public Schools Alpine Sports Club was formed by Sir Henry Lunn, with Wengen a popular destination for its members, Hotel Bernerhof was built on Dorfstrasse to accommodate the ever-increasing demand for tourism services in the area from those seeking the fresh mountain air and undeniably stunning views of the Jungfrau in the heart of the Bernese Oberland.

Hotel Bernerhof's history has been beautifully maintained and the building today has a distinctive quirky vintage feel, writes Colette Redgrave. The recent discovery of the Hotel Guest book dating back to as early as 1922 and several photographs from the late 1960s and early 1970s encapsulate the essence of Wengen,

where time feels often like it stands still. These discoveries will soon be on display in the Hotel Entrance for all to enjoy. piste number and to this day I still have no idea!! Jonny Webster, another off-piste

The current owners - the Family Schweizer - took over the property in 1970 and the Résidence in 1974, providing excellent traditional Swiss-style catering in the restaurant alongside what is now a warm,



family-home-style establishment.

Traditional Swiss Fondu, Raclette, Rösti, Älpler Hörnli and home-made desserts entice customers throughout the summer and winter seasons. Herr Schweizer himself was a proficient sportsman, a keen member of Wengen Curling Club and the connection to the Curling Club is maintained to this day. Frau Schweizer still plays with the club and the hotel hosts regular Club meetings in the Schweizer Stübli, catered for the 2023 Wengen Curling Competitions and often has members at the Stammtisch throughout the winter.

Uniquely, Hotel Bernerhof brings a Latin-American fusion with the family connections to Chile, where Herr Schweizer pursued ed his early career as a hotelier. The responsibility of the Hotel continues now with his daughter, Lidice Schweizer, who is keen to preserve this beautiful Swiss Lodge-style accommodation at the foot of the Männlichen.

Just four minutes from the station, the DHO and ski lift, it is a wonderful place to discover good hearty food at the end of a decent day's skiing. With hearty-sized portions on offer, we invite members of the DHO to enjoy a 5% discount in The Taverne restaurant throughout the forthcoming 2025-26 Winter Season.

Hotel Bernerhof has welcomed members of the DHO for years, including Chaplain, Roger Scoones as recently as 2022 and ski instructor Charlie Murray-Brown, who frequents the property every year. The Secret Skier February 2025

February 1 (Saturday)

Following our usual rule, once February rolls in and the ski traffic starts to increase, we don't ski at the weekends. Today, it's a jaunt over to Hasliberg (covered by the Top 4 Pass and only an hour and a half from Wengen). We take the gondola up to the Alpen Tower to enjoy the incredible views. The look back on the Grosse Scheidegg and Wetterhorn are stunning. The weather is fabulous, and the area is busy. In the afternoon we pop into the Sherlock Holmes museum in Meiringen to review Holmes' final misadventure at the nearby Reichenbach Falls, where both he and his arch nemesis, Professor Moriarty, plunged to their deaths. I am interested to learn that his death caused a massive uproar in London, with much of the city wearing black armbands to mourn the death of their hero. The outcry grew so great, that Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was forced to resurrect Holmes for many more adventures, assuring those faithful readers that Holmes had cheated death at the Falls.

February 2 (Sunday)

We entertain friends from Biel and Zürich. They enjoy sunbathing in the beautiful Wengen weather, as the afternoon temperatures allow one to doff jackets.

I notice mid-morning queues at the Männlichen cable-car for the first time since our arrival. Ski traffic is increasing and will continue to do so in February with the onset of the Swiss school ski-week holidays.

February 3 (Monday)

OK, it's post-weekend and time to get back on the boards. We head over to the Schilthorn area and enjoy another bluebird day. All runs, save for those off Piz Gloria (which remains closed until March), are open. The snow remains good, although some runs off the Gimmeln T-bar are slushy and approaching a spring-skiing feel. The paragliders are out in force, some wearing skis, some not. They launch from the top of the Schilt chair by the dozen, sometimes two or three at a time. That trip floating back down the Lauterbrunnen valley must be something special.

February 4 (Tuesday)

Another bluebird day. Head out to First today. Descending from Männlichen, we note the large lift queues. Seems like a weekend. We also note the cable cars remins surfrom 2023 delwald are uniformly full - strange. At Terminal we note the flood of skiers heading over to the Wengen area

Finally, on the bus to First, the mystery is cleared up. The First cable-car is down. Earliest expected start is 11.00, but no promises. It is 10:55. We have a choice to make, go back up to Eigergletscher or Männlichen and ski the Wengen area, or take a chance and get on the bus to First, hoping their 11.00 start-up actually happens. While we know it is a high-risk decision, we decide to roll the dice and get on the bus to First. That Wengen will now be crowded helps make the decision. If we're right, we'll be geniuses, as we'll have First all to ourselves. Alas, we are not geniuses. At First, word is the cable-car is only taking hikers to Bort, nothing beyond that and the outage is now expected to last all day. So much for that. It is time to get the plans going to replace this cable-car system.

February 5 (Wednesday)

Another, you guessed it, bluebird day. This glorious weather is getting boring, but in a good way. Off to Meiringen-Hasliberg today, which is covered by our Top 4 Pass. It's an hour and a half from Wengen (by train), but on a nice day, well worth it for a change of pace. We head straight up to Mägisalp and on to the Alpen tower, with its fabulous views. The two chairs in the upper







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bowls aren't working (shades of First), so we head over to the Käserstatt area for the morning. Near noon, we see the chairs at Mägisalp are running again, so head over there for a few hours. Lunch at the Häägenstübli is tops (figuratively), soaking in the rays at over 2,000 metres. Then it's back to Käserstatt and a run down to the Balisalp T-bar. We end the day on the ski-out back to Bidmi, but while the ski-out remains open down to Reuti and the cable-car top station, we pass today. The snow is just too heavy down here, like a slush pile. But for most of the day, the snow was first-rate and we can recommend this outing for those who are looking for a break from the Jungfrau region.

February 6 (Thursday)

Bluebird again. We only have half the day, as we need to get ready for a guest. We head up Männlichen. The queue at the Läger is long, so we swing over to the Honnegg early. The sun is only on about half the piste, so we continue up the Arven and over to Lauberhorn, which is in the sun. Enjoy several runs down the Lauberhorn and Wixi, before calling it a day. We finish by skiing the full Lauberhorn Downhill route, which is now open to the public. We pause at the Hundschopf to wonder at that leap those pros take. Better them than us. Chapeau! While we have to head home at 13.00, it is a fantastic morning in paradise. Dropped in on the DHO Club House tonight to see everyone dressed up in their finest early era regalia for the big 100th Anniversary bash at the Regina. Well done, DHO! Here's to the next 100 years!

February 7 (Friday)

Up at 05.00 and off to Zürich airport to pick up our friend. Back to Wengen in time for the unveiling of the plaque at the train station, commemorating the DHO 100 Years in Wengen and the close friendship of the DHO with Jungfrau Railways. Urs Kessler, head of Jungfraubahnen, who will retire this year, brings us up-to-date on some plans. The Fallboden lift will be replaced for the 2026/27 season. Planning is underway to put in a new First cable car, from the Grindelwald train station to the top (Bravo). For the next week, we will entertain a friend who is a non-skier, so the secret skier will be on a brief hiatus.

February 18 (Tuesday)

OK, time to get on those boards again. A lot has happened since last time, most notably a nice dump of snow a few days ago. The pistes are in great shape and it's a bluebird day. We ski the Wengen area, with a swoop down to Terminal and up Eigergletscher. That new V-Bahn does open up options. A trip down to Grindelwald before the V-Bahn always meant losing some time if you wanted to get back up to ski the Kleine Scheidegg area. That's not a factor anymore with the new lifts. Can't wait to say the same thing about First - perhaps within the next three years (Jungfraubahnen, are you listening)? And for our money, Fallboden can go in the queue, we think First needs to be next up in terms of renewal. First should come first!

February 20 (Thursday)

Overcast morning. By the time we're at Winteregg to ski the Schilthorn region, the snow is coming down thick and wet and the light is flat - can't see much. We do a few loops at Winteregg, then over to the Schilt. Now, the sun is peeking through. The Gimmeln lift is operating, so we do a few circuits off it, watching as the paragliders start to appear - they are like the sun. Sun's out, they're out. Then it's over to Birg to finish the day on the upper chairs (Riggli, Muttleren, Kandahar). The day has cleared up and the afternoon provides great runs in the sun.

February 21 (Friday)

So, it's our last day on the boards this season. And what a day! Bluebird most of the day, with haze in the afternoon. We concentrate on the Wengen area. After the four-cabin wait on Männlichen, the lift queues are tolerable and the snow is good. Warmer today, so we find ourselves in sugar snow by the end of the day. Do all the classics, even a run on Gummi, which we haven't done in some time. We figure a fitting way to end the day and the season is a full run of the Lauberhorn World Cup, from the start hut. We lean forward, over the timing wand, the way we see the pros do it and then let loose. It's a great run. Slower than the pros, but with all the traffic, that's understandable. Another great season. This year we leave with the pistes in great shape, sure to provide some quality skiing well into March. Auf Wiedersehen, Wengen!





A letter from Robin Maris

Dear Brian,

Thank you for the DHO History book. Very interesting and brings back memories of wonder times in Wengen.

The holiday always started at Victoria Station, then watching your luggage being slung on board the ferry at Dover/Folkestone, followed by the expectant train journey to the Alps. Mind you, at one time you could fly into Bern and be on the train to Wengen in a very short time.

Family ties go back to at least 1936. My maternal grandfather, Colonel W P Cutlack and his third (!!) wife and my mother and father (on honeymoon) went in February 1936. Enclosed is my parents' hotel bill for the week (in Francs) in the Grand Victoria. Also two photos for that year. Grandfather with fancy dress friends (third from the reader's right).

The other photo, again from 1936, is more interesting. This is my mother learning to curl. The man in black is Halford Hewitt, who gave a trophy for the curlers as well for the public school ski races (what happened to those races?). He also gave the prize for the Public School golf tournament and the prizes at Royal Worthington Golf Club



where he was a member, as I am. Note in the background the Wengen Curling Club Hut that later doubled as the DHO office.

Grandfather was a 'Patron' of the DHO, whatever that meant, in about 1937, along with his son Robin who was killed at the fall of Singapore (as noted in The Downhill Only Club A History, on page 40). Grandfather's third wife joined in 1946, my father in 1949 and myself in 1960.

My father gave up skiing and took up curling when he could not keep up with his children. He did give us two very good bits of advice. If you could side slip you could ski any slope and never try to turn on ice of which there was a lot before ski bashers.

I think that I have stayed in many of the hotels including the YMCA (somewhere up past the cinema). Staying in the Falken with Frau Cova was experience, something out of Victorian times. If you had clear soup one day it was thick soup the next, but it was fun.

In early family days we usually stayed at the Metropole (which later became the Sunstar, then briefly the Alpine and in its latest incarnation, writing in 2025, is the Braunbär). My mother also played the organ at the English church at times.

As for skiing I can remember being led astray by Harold Thorpe on a DHO run in the woods below Wasserstation: too many trees and a foot of new snow.

If my memory has not gone I think I put money towards the DHO flat in InnerWengen but that was a long time ago.

Wengen is not all about skiing. We all tried ice skating and luging down from just below Wasserstation and of course tea at the Schönegg and maybe a Fondue during the holiday and do not forget the Apple Fritters at Brandegg.

I could go on but do not want to bore you any longer. If you are going to the 100-year dinner I hope you have a wonderful evening.

The third photo is of my mother and father with my wife Ann and myself in 1966. Sometime in the future I might come across other interesting photos.

British International Schoolboys Races

Last year's journal had an article by Richard Berry, long-time Race Secretary and Organiser for the British International Schoolboys Races that have been held in various resorts, but more recently in Wengen.

I took over the task of Race Secretary from him last summer, halfway through the organising for the 2025 races, which as it turns out was a sensible time. Most of the main work had been done and it gave me a chance to see that, and to assess what else needed to be done.

There is a fair amount of administration involved, booking race courses, equipment, SOS services, trains, which are directly involved with the races. There's also the background stuff, hotels for the organising committee, lunches for on the hill and so on. Normally the schools arrive either on the preceding Saturday or Sunday, to give the boys a chance of one or two days of training before the event. A fun parallel slalom is held the day before the main events; this year due to various circumstances we held it on the Figeller slope in the village, which meant we could get more spectators. The weather wasn't kind, it was held in persistent rain, but this didn't seem to worry the racers and it was a good fun event.

Due to the still unkind weather forecast we decided to swap the days round for the

slalom and the GS races. At 06.30h on Tuesday I walked up to the station in 30cm of fresh snow. After catching the train up to Wengernalp a bit later with the teams, we arrived at the station with the snow depth higher than the step off the train!

Inspecting the course at Bumps and watching the 50cm of new snow that had fallen up there, clogging up the piste basher, the reluctant decision was made to cancel the slalom race: 156 schoolboys racing down the soft snow was too much of a risk for injury. The boys quickly disappeared off with their trainers for a day of powder skiing which was an unexpected bonus.

Luckily the day of the GS race dawned clear and bright; a threat of wind meant there was a possibility of a delayed start, but all was well and we began on time.

It was amazing to see a well oiled machine of organisation begin with all our organising committee and volunteers making sure things ran smoothly. Two runs each for 156 boys is no mean feat!


A moment of delay and concern was efficiently dealt with thanks to our SOS team, one racer being helicoptered to hospital as a precaution but returning to the village that evening. A slight mishap as the helicopter was landing meant that some competitor sheets and a memory card with

photos of some of the racers got blown away in the draught.

After the race was over, a clear-up of the course and start hut, and a check to make sure all our organising staff were safely off the mountain, there was a mad dash to get the results sorted out. The prizes then had to be organised and the cinema set up for the prizegiving ceremony. Some parents of one of our racers had kindly organised a podium delivery for the event which made for a great photo opportunity, especially with three teams of four boys trying to all get on it together.

Some of the schools were making a quick dash for a plane after prizegiving, while some had a few more days of skiing in the resort. Hopefully they all had an enjoyable time and we look forward to seeing them all again next year.

The event couldn't take place without the help we received from the officials, the various teams on the mountain and in the village and equally as important the parents, teachers and DHO member volunteers. There are so many that helped it's difficult to name everyone individually but we are incredibly grateful for everyone's help and input, and of course are now looking for volunteers for next year! Which isn't very far away...

The 24/25 competion between Kandahar and the DHO is now in its third year – an infant when the founding years of the clubs are taken into consideration – 1924 and 1925. So, like they did 100 years ago, Kandahar members descended to Lauterbrunnen on December 29 2924, and ascended to Scheidegg to do battle with their longstanding friends and foes.

In 1925 Kandahar had a back-up team carrying all sorts of racing paraphernalia, the likes of which had never before been seen in Wengen. I am sure this time we were as prepared as they were, but alas, like then, the Kandahar beat us, but only by 10% overall.

Kandahar won the original event in 1925 by 33.5 points to 15.5 points, but as far as I can see Ken Foster's detailed report of the day says nothing about times and margins of victory. The DHO is no doubt showing long-term signs of improvement; 10% should not be unovercomeable!

The Lauberhorn was at its best, the sun was at its best, the two giant slalom runs were a delight, and while the Kandahar and DHO troopers repaired to the Allmend restaurant for a beer and some nibbles, Liz Moore and I, with invaluable help from Sean McCarthy and Simon Phillips – one from each club, just in case – worked out the times. This was

not FIS standard timing, accurate to 1/100th of a second, but it became clear early on that we had been beaten, and hundredths of seconds would not have mattered.

The Kandahar, who also beat us last year, forgot the cup in Mürren - maybe they knew something we did not know - so there was no formal prizegiving but just 'auf wiederluege' until December 28 2025, when we will meet to fight it out again.

Summer of 1975 by David Henderson

The following article has its origins in the publicity drive undertaken by a small band of DHO brothers (and sisters) as part of preparations for the Club's centenary celebrations.

Spin-offs in addition to articles dedicated to the DHO included its being referenced in a full-length article on the BBC website in March, written by Imogen Foulkes in Geneva and including a quote from Hon Editor being quoted on a separate matter.

Out of the blue came a communication to the Hon Editor from David Henderson, one of the group of Scottish people working in Wengen for the summer as had become the norm in those days. David and the Hon Ed worked together at the Grand Hotel Palace & National (aka The Palace) from June to September 1975, and had never exchanged so much as a word since then.

Having trained as a history/politics teacher, who moved into writing about education. His principal job for 20 years was as an Edinburgh-based news reporter for The Times Education Supplement (Scotland). He left journalism in 2006 at the age of 53 and took the plunge into painting in 2006 (painting landscape pictures, not walls and ceilings). He quickly accepted the invitation

to put pen to paper about that summer and authorised us to use his vision of the Lauterbrunnen Valley alongside his musings.

Bruce Springsteen sings the praises of the summer of '69, writes David Henderson. For me, it was '75. That summer was unforgettable and changed my life.

I fell in love. Twice. Wengen was one. The other was a tall, slim girl who I spied walking along Dorfstrasse. She looked kind of familiar. In fact, like me, she was an Edinburgh University student. Of all the places...

50-plus years on I'm still pals with both. Wengen, like many, I've come to love in winter and summer and I'm still in touch with an ex-waitress from the Alpenrose.

She at least had language skills. Me? School German and I was ill-prepared for my three months at the Palace Hotel, or as I learned, "Otel Pal..ass". I put the ass in the Palace.

I didn't know it then in late June, and I suppose I've always been a lucky kind of guy, but I'd nabbed the best summer job in the village. And there were many Scottish students in Wengen that summer.

I was tennis court attendant and relief

Nachtportier, mainly, but also parasol unfolder on the sun-terrace, window cleaner and dogsbody for José, the Spanish concierge (his wife, Maria, was the Gouvernante, or head of housekeeping). We got on, just, José and I.


But the work was outside in the sun, and when it rained, which it did regularly in the summer of 1975, I was permitted to pack it in for the day.

It meant nothing to me either that the blaize tennis court down the street and its ramshackle wooden chalet was the DHO base. I had to ask what that was. But skiing had entered my world for the first time.

It was tough work. Rising early, out in the crisp summer morning, sun shining, sweeping the courts and looking around at the most wonderful scenery imaginable.

And every morning the same routine, gaping at that arc of snow up there (the Silberhorn), that distant snow-covered peak (the Breithorn), and that amazing valley and waterfall over there (Lauterbrunnen).


Of course, I had to clean the tennis club toilet, sweep the floors and make things tidy but it wasn't a bad deal.

And then I had to repeat in the afternoon after the morning tennis lessons with the extra joy of watering the courts when the sun had baked the blaize.

I remember writing home to my parents, wildly excited about my "Heidi" experience. On days off, I walked the signposted trails with mates, up to Kleine Scheidegg, over to Grindelwald or across the valley to Mürren. The wanderwegs took you up through the wildflower-drenched pastures where the locals scythed the hay for their cattle. It was a timeless activity. Throw in the cowbells and the characteristic wooden chalets and it was everything you imagined Switzerland to be.


It was the Bernese Oberland mountains that triggered my subsequent passion for the outdoors. When I returned to Edinburgh after that summer, I bought my first pair of walking boots and the rain gear to match. I learned to love skiing, to walk the Scottish mountains in all seasons and latterly paint them as a full-time artist. Still do.

In Wengen, there were obviously other aspects I loved and those included regular evenings in the corner of the old Eiger Bar where the Scots and our friends met up over a beer, at the round table we later realised was the Stammtische, which everyone but us knew was reserved for the use of locals. No wonder they sometimes drew us hideously dirty looks.

The music of summer '75 ranged from the Eagles to Edinburgh's Bay City Rollers. Enough said. Then there were the Saturday afternoon football matches between the Scots and the Italian waiters at a height of around 4,000 feet above sea level in 75 degrees, played on the side of a mountain on rough ground.

The latter won the first two matches but refused to play after we'd won the third handsomely! All true. The Hon Ed insists he has an entry in his diary from that summer that reads: Scotland 12:4 Italy.

I bond with Springsteen when he summarised: "That summer seemed to last forever...

"And if I had the choice, yeah, I'd always want to be there. Those were the best days of my life"

The summer of '75 was certainly up there with the best times of my life. Thanks to the "Otel Pal...ass" for its understanding and to the village of Wengen. And thanks to the DHO Journal for allowing me to take this trip down Memory Lane.

I'm afraid to admit my skiing and hillwalking days are over more or less. I've got arthritis in both knees and hips and struggle to walk sometimes. Bloody old age.

But when I could ski...I wrote extensively about school skiing in The Times
Educational Supplement, going on random trips to write about students' experiences and keeping an eye on developments in the industry.

I wrote for the Glasgow-based Skiing UK magazine(long gone) and contributed irregular articles to Scottish newspapers, like The Scotsman. An undoubted highlight was skiing the "new" 1992 Olympic downhill course on the Face de Bellevarde in Val d'Isere, with the chief pisteur as guide, three weeks before the race.

Skiing was all, and for 13 years I ran ski holidays for East Edinburgh Ski Club, carrying up to 90 skiers, to the French resorts of La Plagne, Flaine, Val d'Isere and Les Arcs. Our agent was Erna Low Travel.

And it was through an Erna Low press trip to La Plagne and Flaine I skied with Arnie Wilson, then of the Financial Times and doyen among ski writers, not least because he could ski anything. I came to respect his writing and did my best to follow his tracks on snow.

I knew of the skiing tragedy that took the life of Lucy Dicker, Arnie's partner, and I'm delighted to know there is a DHO trophy in her memory.



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DHO Centenary Scholarship

It's difficult to sum up this year and season for me, it's been such a long and important year for me, with both academics, and my freestyle skiing, yet it's gone by in a flash.

I'm going to start in September, where I was accepted to the University of Manchester to study Civil Engineering (if anyone needs an intern let me know!), on a sports Scholarship. Going into my first weeks of Uni, I knew it was going to be a huge challenge to balance both my Skiing, and getting a degree, but I was ready to give it everything I have.

Flying into November, I kicked off the year with two FIS indoor competitions in world-renowned Snozone Madrid. Although not the most well known competitions, they were useful in giving me points, which I would later need to compete in Europa Cup competitions. It was great to kick off the season getting a top 10 in one of the seasons, although I was a bit disappointed that I didn't do better.

Only a few weeks after this, pre-season started in a private Snowpark, in Corvatsch, Switzerland. We were there for 10 days on a freezing icy glacier, which had snow on the Park, and just about nowhere else. Seven of

us spent the time learning new tricks that we wouldn't normally do, but are fundamental for competition runs. The casualties included one concussion, ACL (anterior cruciate ligament) damage, broken shoulder, and a tweaked knee...only three of us made it out unscathed.

Thankful to be alive, I headed back to Uni to recover the weeks I had missed over the months, before a much-needed Christmas and New Year in Wengen (doing one more FIS competition in Schilthorn in the meantime). Soon, I was preparing for my next competition for the World University Games at Bardonecchia, Turin, Italy, in early to mid-January.

Having abandoned most of my University exams, we were inducted into the games with a spectacular opening ceremony, including the Cirque du Soleil, and Chiellini. We then headed to the mountains for a Slopestyle and Big Air competition.

It was another icy and precarious course, once again leading to several of my competitors and teammates kissing goodbye to their ACLs for 12 months. Despite this, I managed to come top 10, in the first ever televised competition that I had ever been in, giving me enough points to compete in

European Cup competitions.

Returning to University, I finished off the exams I hadn't missed, and and slipped back into Uni life. However after physio on my knee which I had hurt during the competition, and an MRI (magnetic resonance imaging scan) covered by TASS (the UK government's Talented Athlete Scholarship Scheme), I found out I had a grade two tear

on my right MCL (medial collateral ligament). This was a blow, but it came at a good time. It was only an eight-week recovery, and I had no plans for competitions in the meantime.

It was during this time that I was awarded the Centenary Scholarship by the DHO, which I was extremely grateful for, and it fuelled my recovery, as I prepared for my first ever European Cup, going full circle back to Corvatsch, from pre-season.

Having seen the size of the jumps in pre-season, and of course with conditions having changed massively, I knew I needed to hit the ground running, after a long break post-injury. However this was actually a Europa Cup Premium, meaning we were going to be riding on the exact same course as the competitions who had just finished competing in the World Championships, only a week-and-aahalf before. Therefore I knew I had my hands full turning up to the competition.

Then, after only a day of training qualifications came upon us. Unfortunately, I was put in the morning heats, which are well as meaning I have to get up early). I was dropping nearly last in my heat, and unfortunately I reverted a trick on my first run, which means switching from forwards to backwards, on the ground, and is as good as a fall. In run two, my run was going well, having landed all of my tricks, but unfortunately I came down on the final jump, meaning I didn't score very well.

Then came Big Air. I was far less worried about this, as I only had to land one trick, to slot myself mid-table, which was ultimately my aim for my first European cup. Straight away on my first run, I put down a double cork 1080, which is two flips and three full rotations, but quite a standard trick for this level of competition.

I was ecstatic with this result, and on my second run decided to go for a harder trick, to try and overtake many of the other athletes who had done the same trick. However since my second run was around an hour later, the conditions had become slightly more slushy, and this slight change in speed caused me to barely catch my tips on the knuckle of the jump (flat part before the landing).

One or two km/h faster, and I would have

of my competition runs down. With that, the season came to a finish. I returned to University, to finish my lectures, and sit my second semester exams. I also collected full-performance Sports Colours, and became part of UOM's prestigious XXI club, filled with current and ex-Athletes from UOM.

Overall, I was very happy with my season, and to get through it mostly in one piece, and put some solid results down. I want to thank the DHO, Colin at Skiset Wengen, the Sports Department at UOM, and of course my family. It was a great season, and I cannot wait to begin training over the summer, ahead of my 2025/26 season







Obituary: **Dermot Gilvary**

November 2024, aged 72 By Donald McCutchan


Dermot Gilvary died suddenly in November 2024, aged 72, just two weeks after celebrating with friends at the Kandahar 100th anniversary Ball.

Dermot joined the DHO in 1999, having been introduced by the SCGB rep. He had started skiing later in life, but became proficient through attendance on SCGB Freshtracks holidays. He became the Advertising Manager for the DHO Journal in 2015 in an honorary capacity, and served as a director of the club up to 2019. Although not a racer himself, he was an enthusiastic supporter of the AICC races, wherever they were held.

Dermot was Head of English and Drama at Oakham School. He welcomed the late Oueen Elizabeth to Oakham School when she came to open the school's theatre, named in her honour. Some of his pupils have gone on to successful acting careers, and Dermot himself had some success as a playwright. He was a past director of the Graham Greens International Festival. His advice was sought by at least one budding author within the

He was a keen golfer at Luffenham Heath, and organized several successful DHO golf days at Rutland Water GC. He was a passionate cricketer, captain of the Oakham club and a life member of the MCC. He proudly maintained an MGB car, and would travel long distances in it.

Both at school and on the ski slopes, Dermot had a reputation for arriving "just in time." He would frustrate fellow skiers by arriving with just a few seconds to spare, but he never missed a train! He always had plenty of stories to tell during breaks from skiing, or on the lifts. His favourite mountain restaurant was the Grindelwaldblick, where he enjoyed the Black Forest Gateaux and Nussgipfel with his tea.

If one met Dermot after a year apart, the conversation would pick up as though you had just stepped out of the room. He was a great confidante of the younger members of the DHO. One young lady tells us: "Off the piste, Dermot's signature smile would be familiar to many of the DHO offspring. He could put younger and less assured members immediately at ease. His laughter was offered generously, and he showed an equal interest in everyone."

Dermot resigned from the DHO in 2019, following the vexatious EGM, and thereafter joined the Kandahar Ski Club, who welcomed him with an immediate award of a Silver Medal, in respect of his earlier contribution to skiing.

Obituary: *Harold Guy Clayton*

1936-2025

It is with deep sadness that the Downhill Only Club marks the passing of Harold Guy Clayton, affectionately known to us all as Guy, who died peacefully at home on February 1 2025 at the age of 88. A longstanding member of the Club and a familiar face on the slopes of Wengen, Guy will be remembered for his warmth, camaraderie, and unwavering passion for downhill skiing. His loss is deeply felt across the DHO community, where he leaves behind an enduring legacy of friendship and sportsmanship.

In the beginning

Guy was born in Cheam on March 22 1936 and spent his early childhood there. During the Second World War, his family relocated briefly to Buxton after a near-miss by a doodlebug (V1 flying bomb) striking close to their Cheam home – a brush with history that thankfully left them unharmed. In Cheam he was a near neighbour of Alan Norris – a fellow DHO member.

Guy's schooling began at The Dragon School in Oxford and continued at Uppingham, where he was known more for his prowess on the rugby field than for academic accolades – a precursor to the energetic, team-spirited character he came to be. Rugby captured his heart early on, and he carried that enthusiasm into adulthood, playing as a proud member of the Woodford Rugby Club after his school years.

National Service and sporting passions

Upon leaving school, Guy fulfilled his National Service with the 4th Tank Regiment of the Royal Armoured Corps. He looked back on that time with fondness, often recalling the camaraderie and adventure of Army life. It was an experience that forged many lifelong friendships and a sense of fellowship that he would later find in his beloved ski club.

After his time in the Army, Guy continued to pursue vigorous activities – from weekend

rugby matches to alpine skiing. This blend of discipline and fun, nurtured in the Tank Regiment and on the rugby pitch, would become hallmarks of his character.

Downhill Only Club Involvement

Guy discovered a passion for the Bernese Oberland after a visit to the Giessbach Falls near Brienz in the late 1940s, and later for skiing as a young adult. Having visited Wengen on many occasions during his years at Basel-based chemical company Ciba-Geigy, Guy always found time to divert from Basel.

His favourite hotel was always the Falken and he also enjoyed lengthy stays in the Alpenheim back when it was a farmhouse.

Guy joined the Downhill Only Club in the late 1990s, and together with his wife Virginia – his devoted partner of 61 years (who sadly predeceased him in 2023), he became an integral part of the DHO. Guy threw himself into Club life with characteristic zeal, "a stalwart of the Club" according to a previous DHO Journal. Whether carving down the Lauberhorn or sharing tales on the train up to Kleine Scheidegg, Guy embraced every aspect of the Wengen experience.

Fellow members recall how readily he volunteered his time to support Club activities. He served often as a guide and mentor to newcomers – the first to say "Follow me, you'll be fine" to a newcomer, or to impart a useful tip on handling a tricky slope.

Guy also lent his organisational talents to the DHO: he helped arrange technical ski training courses for members, eager to see others improve and enjoy the sport as much as he did. No task was too small or too great if it benefited the Club. Guy loved not only to help coordinate races, but compete in them too, and he was proud to know his children and grandchildren inherited his fondness for the friendly competition of DHO races.


Character and Club legacy

Those who skied with Guy will remember a man of boundless enthusiasm, kindness, and good humour. He had an easygoing charm and a genuine interest in people that drew others to him on and off the piste.

Apres-ski evenings in Wengen were often brightened by Guy's presence – he was a natural storyteller, regaling friends with many an anecdote. In fact, his adventurous spirit extended beyond skiing. In one memorable winter, Guy decided to try his hand at curling on the ice rinks of Wengen.

In true Guy fashion, he not only learned the game but went on to win a local curling tournament (the Falken Pairs) after only a couple of lessons – a feat proudly reported in the DHO Journal: "Guy fancied a change of sport and found himself on the winner's board after only a couple of lessons".

Guy loved a bit of friendly competition and fun, and he pursued it with the same grace and modesty whether he was on skis, with a rugby ball, or sliding a curling stone. His adventures include getting lost in fog in a helicopter with Dr Allensbach on the way to Bern hospital. Guy skied well into his 70s (and threatened to strap his old boots on for many years after what was ultimately his last run home). After many winters as a seasonaire, Guy continued to happily spend much time with family at his beloved Chalet Central.



Above all, Guy's legacy in the Club is one of fellowship and family. He not only derived joy from skiing himself, but also from seeing others – especially the younger generations – take to the mountains.

Guy and Virginia's presence in Wengen each season symbolised the very spirit of the Downhill Only Club: a multi-generational community bound by friendship, respect, and a shared passion for downhill skiing. Many of us will cherish the memory of seeing Guy, eyes twinkling beneath his ski helmet, setting off confidently down a favourite run, then later raising a glass with friends to celebrate the day's adventures.

In losing Guy, the DHO has lost a true gentleman and a pillar of our club. We exte nd our deepest condolences to his family, with profound gratitude for sharing this remarkable man with us for so many years. Guy's imprint on the Downhill Only Club will remain.

Virginia and Guy were proud members of the DHO 100 club, and his name is woven into the Club's rich history – from the participation and help with races and events where his hearty laugh echoed, to the countless personal kindnesses he showed to members new and old.

We will remember Guy on every snowy slope we ski down and in each gathering where stories of past runs are told. His life was a testament to friendship, loyalty, and the joy of living life in motion.

Guy will be deeply missed, but his legacy will continue to inspire all of us in the Downhill Only Club. As we push off downhill – "downhill only," as ever – we know Guy is with us in spirit, smiling encouragingly and urging us to enjoy the ride.

Rest in peace, Guy, and thank you for the tracks you left for us to follow.



Obituary: **Philip Taylor**

Sunday May 4, aged 86

Longstanding DHO member Philip Taylor passed away on Sunday May 4, aged 86. A key contributor to the 100 club, helping to raise money to buy what is now the Clubroom in the former Hotel Eiger, Philip suffered a stroke just after Christmas 2024. This prevented him from travelling to Wengen in 2025 for the first time in many years.

He had been improving but suffered a setback and ultimately died peacefully in hospital with his family by his side.

Philip Keats Taylor was born in Doncaster in September 1938, grew up in Yorkshire and was living in Follifoot, near Harrogate, when he passed. An accountant and software developer, he built two companies that combined both skills. The last one was called Squaresum which delivered accounting software to businesses.

Philip told his own story of how he discovered skiing in an article published in The Daily Telegraph in January 2024. In the late 1960s, he worked in the computing department at Rolls-Royce in Derby. "After a year or so, they moved me to Glasgow," he relates. "One of the staff members there was tasked with welcoming me and as secretary of the Glasgow Ski Club she took me to their weekly socials."

In due course, this translated into joining them on ski trips to Glenshee in the Cairngorms. "It was hideous, thick fog and a howling gale," he recalls. "Being a Yorkshireman, however, I wanted to get some value from the clobber I'd bought to do this strange activity and so I went on the next one, to Aviemore this time. It was challenging, primitive. There was a chairlift and three tow lifts. I used to describe it as learning how to ice skate over heather and rocks. It was fun, though.

"In 1985, I joined the Downhill Only Club and started racing. It was also the time when

I started taking all my nieces skiing. Today, I take my nieces and their kids too. They all ski better than me because it's best to start young. But you can take up skiing in later life. I knew a Yorkshireman who started in this 50s and he skied reasonably well. He was a bit stiff, like a wooden soldier, but he was fit and got himself a lot of instruction."

"Philip was hugely sociable and a member of many clubs," writes Alistair Callander, a fellow DHO member and husband of Philip's niece, Jenny, bringing us firmly back to the present.

"He loved introducing people to skiing and I can't thank him enough for passing his passion on to so many, including my children and I. He skied in St Anton just before Christmas last year, aged 86, and insisted on going out with us in a white out. He never wanted to miss a day on the slopes!

"He enjoyed the DHO races, like the McMillan. I'm not sure the last time he entered but I do remember him trying to win the over 70s!"


I didn't know that a worker bee's lifespan was 34 days. I didn't know that they take on seven different jobs in that time and fly to collect nectar only in their last few days. I didn't know that a beehive might have 30,000 to 70,000 bees in it. I didn't know that around 90% of bees in a beehive are female (doing all of the work). I didn't know that the queen has a lifespan of two to five years during which she lays up to 2,000 eggs a day (once a drone has inseminated a queen, he dies). Or that male bees cannot feed themselves and at the end of summer are basically kicked out by the females and left to die.

If you want to know more interesting facts about bees and their behaviour, including the mechanics and purpose of the waggle dance, and be made to think about how life in a beehive might contain useful lessons for humans, in particular corporate life humans, you will probably enjoy reading Bee Wise (see beewisebook.com), which starts with the author standing in his beekeeper's suit on the wing of a Boeing 737 at Basel airport in May 2019 rescuing a swarm of bees which had trapped itself there.

The publicity for the book tells us that beekeeper and leadership coach Philip Atkinson lifts the lid on what happens inside a busy beehive. Forget the career ladder is one piece of advice offered, as success lies in building your honeycomb. Don't be as busy as a bee, is another. It not only advises readers to slow down and create time to think but offers guidance on how to do just that.

The core of Atkinson's argument is that much like a beehive, successful businesses rely on collaboration, clarity of roles, and a shared sense of purpose. The book introduces key themes such as the importance of teamwork, the value of communication, and the need for adaptability. It is structured through the yearly cycle with 12 chapters focussing on a lesson. Each lesson invites you to learn from bees and reflect on your own role as a leader and role-model. Essential reading for any parent or aspiring parent, one might suggest.

Every purchase helps raise awareness and fund campaigns for Bees for Development, a global charity that supports communities to make and sell honey as a sustainable business. How could even the most cynical of hardened cynics quibble with that?



Book Review: The Great Mosquito Hunt Elizabeth Manson-Bahr

I have never read a book - whether fiction or non-fiction - in which the opening paragraph of the first formal chapter tells of a man lying in a wheelbarrow with an enormous swollen scrotum. But that is what Elizabeth Manson-Bahr gives us in what I naively thought was going to be a genteel family history using the battle to discover the causes of malaria as a McGuffin.

Medicine and missionaries feature prominently in the book's prologue, but not elephantiasis, of which her great grandfather discovered the causes of the ailment afflicting the patient in the wheelbarrow, removed 80lbs of tumour from him and then found himself being sued for loss of earnings. The patient had, it seems, used his swollen extremities as a table for the selling of lemonade and peanuts.

Sir Patrick Manson, the great grandfather in question, was a doctor, and a Scot, who was the first scientist to prove insects were vectors of disease and founded the London School of Tropical Medicine. When he was 11 years of age, he shot a wild cat and extracted a tapeworm from his intestines (as any self-respecting 11-year-old boy would enjoy doing).

His later discoveries as a doctor saved millions of lives, we read.

On the third page of that first chapter we have a patient of his private practice in Amoy (now Xiamen) having a leech released from his nose after an injection of salt and water into the nostril. The imagery is as vivid as the subject matter and geography are wide-ranging. In the first few hundred words on 19th century life in China, we have tigers, beggars, merchants, bound feet and the stench of unwashed bodies. Washing was shunned because of the risk of contaminating the heavenly Yang of the upper body with the earthier Ying of the lower body.

In 1872 Patrick removed one ton of blubber and impressive amounts of blood from 237 patients, including the man in the wheelbarrow. All without antibiotics and blood transfusions and with only two deaths recorded.

Next time, dear readers, you pine for the good old days, these WERE the good old days.

In Fiji, in 1948, the eating of human flesh was forbidden, but not forgotten. Cannibalism was not a way of adding protein to the diet. You ate your enemy because you hated him.

The cast of characters and range of geographies can be confusing, but history is not a simple A to Z subject. In this small volume the author ranges across space and time, taking in China, Egypt, Russia, Fiji, Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya, New Orleans, the Blue Ridge mountains, Mexico, Pitcairn Island, England, Saltcoats in Ayrshire, Scotland, and finally Surbiton where the author eventually found a husband.



Name drops keep falling on the reader's head. Marco Polo, David Livingstone, Ernest Shackleton, Thor Heyerdahl, Pablo Neruda, Garcia Lorca. Not needless displays of erudition but evidence, it seems to this reader, of unusually broad exposure, direct and indirect, to the world's countries, cultures and customs.

The Gulf of Mexico appears in the epilogue, some 243 captivating pages after we started with Fiji. Maybe in the reprint we will see the qualifying phrase 'now Gulf of America' immediately after its mention.

This is a hugely entertaining book which will appeal to a wide cross-section of the population. I commend it to the membership, and others, subject, of course, to tariffs...
